CASE STUDY - OCTOBER 2020: WOMENS COMMUNITY SHELTERS X PAYCE FOUNDATION X BRIDGE HOUSING

Pathways Home is a collaboration conceived by PAYCE Foundation, Women's Community Shelters (WCS) and Bridge Housing.

- **PAYCE** has made five properties available for the purposes of the project.
- Bridge Housing provides property and tenancy management services under the partnership.
- WCS provides outreach case management and identifies suitable tenants for housing. Case management supports client identified goals and priorities to enhance wellbeing and build self-efficacy.



Beecroft House Social Impact Valuation (ASVB)

- Outcome: Homelessness to secure accommodation
- Participants: 21
- Cost of the program: \$190,512
- Net benefit: \$394,202
- Net benefit per participant: \$18,772







How can philanthropy make a difference?

- Provide the stable platform that enables us to take risks in service provision
- Appetite for innovation
- Back projects that governments won't/can't
- Invest in capacity building
- Connections and networks
- Trust the expertise but expect outcomes
- Learn from successes and failures







Older women have been identified as the fastest growing demographic of people experiencing homelessness.



Almost 43% of lone females over 65 are in rental stress, with the highest numbers living in Gosford and Wyong



In 2016, 20.9% of the region's population were 65 years and above compared to 13.9% in Greater Sydney.
